Since owls represent wisdom and intelligence, it makes sense to cover education in this season's Buddy Bear Newsletter. One of the biggest influences on academic achievement is music. Research has shown that a music education, along with today's academics, can enhance formal learning and life skills for kids.

Music Enhances Language and IQ

Experts agree that music education can help strengthen verbal competence. Equally, a study at the University of Toronto found that children who received weekly voice and piano lessons have an increase in IQ overall.

Music Enhances Cognition

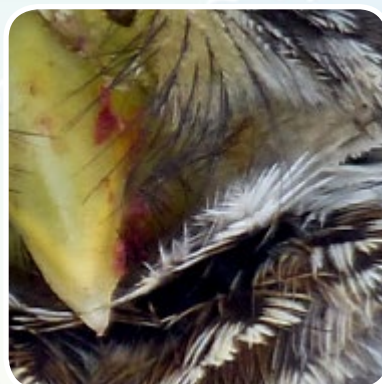
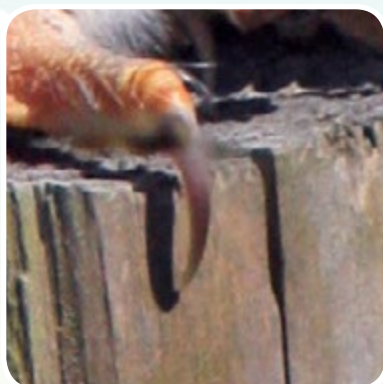
Music can even benefit the way kids think. Kids who are involved in music in some capacity have a larger growth of neural activity. A study by Boston College found changes in brain images of kids who enjoyed weekly music lessons over a 15-month period. It's an impressive fact that gets better when we look at test scores.

Music Enhances Education

A study by the University of Kansas found that kids in music programs often scored higher on standardized tests: 22% higher in English and 20% better in math. Music also helps with memory recall and organizational skills.

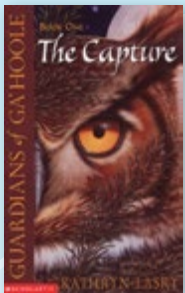

Paper Bag Owl Puppet

Let's make an owl out of a paper bag and some craft supplies. It will be a HOOT!

Supplies:

- Brown paper bag
- Craft paper (four different colors)
- Scissors
- Glue



Instructions:

1. Using the construction paper, cut two 2-inch circles that will be used for the eyes. Then cut two smaller circles to finish the eyes.
2. Now, cut a triangle beak and two triangle ears.
3. On another piece of construction paper, trace each of your hands and cut the shape out.
4. Cut 2 inches off the bottom of your paper bag.
5. Then glue your handprints on the back of the bag so they appear to be wings.
6. Add the eyes, beak and ears to your owl with glue.
7. Have fun with your owl paper bag puppet.
