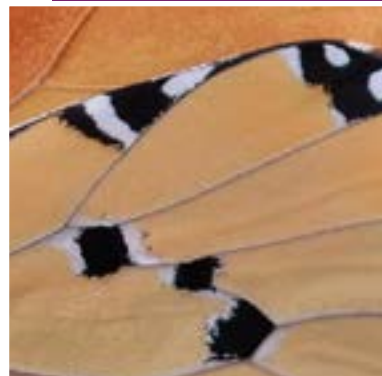
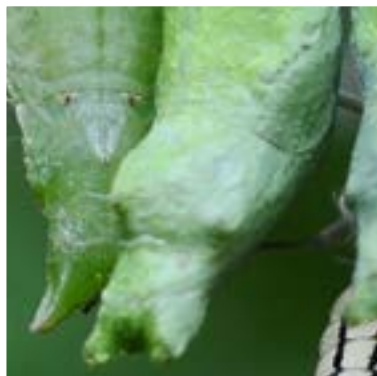

Parents' Corner

Wow them with your butterfly knowledge

The life cycle of a Monarch butterfly is rather interesting. Because kids love to learn, here's a quick bit of info you can share with your little ones when they ask about butterflies.

Monarch butterflies progress through four life stages in one year. They are the egg, larvae (caterpillar), pupa (chrysalis or cocoon), and adult.

Laying Eggs

In late winter and early spring, the hibernating butterflies wake up, mate, and lay eggs.

Egg Hatch

In March and April, the eggs begin to hatch. A caterpillar will eat everything around them and start to grow at an incredible pace. In just two weeks, it will be fully grown. Then, it will attach itself to a secure branch or other location with silk and begin its metamorphosis.

Chrysalis

During the first 10 days, the caterpillar is changing a lot inside the cocoon.

Emerging

Once it is done with the metamorphosis, the butterfly will emerge, work at stretching its wings, and then enjoy what is left of the summer temperatures. Most butterflies live up to six weeks.

Next Generations

Monarch butterflies that emerge from their cocoon in September and October migrate to warmer climates. These butterflies live up to eight months, hibernate, and begin the whole process again.

Toilet Paper Tube Butterfly

Get your supplies ready and have fun making this butterfly with your parents

Supplies:

- Toilet paper tube
- Craft paper (various colors)
- Pipe cleaners (various colors)
- Googly eyes
- Pencil
- Scissors
- Glue



Instructions:

1. Wrap the toilet paper tube in your favorite color. Cut off the excess.
2. Mark a spot 1" from the top of the tube with your pencil. Make three more marks just below the first one, spacing each one just a little bit. Do the same on the other side of the tube.
3. Ask your parents to poke a small hole on each of your pencil marks.
4. Cut 8 pipe cleaners into 8-inch long pieces.
5. Cut 1 pipe cleaner into a 4-inch long piece.
6. Bend your pipe cleaners and stick two of them into the first hole. Then put the other ends into the next hole down. Repeat the process for the rest to make the wings.
7. Glue the shorter pipe cleaner into the inside of the tube to form the antenna.
8. Add your googly eyes and draw a face on your butterfly.
