### Parents' Corner

The warmer weather is your chance to get your kiddos outside and exploring the Northwest's amazing array of flowers and plants. We've put together some ideas to help you get started.

#### Make a Garden Journal

Together with your children, draw and journal the flowers you see in your yard and neighborhood. Include when the flowers bloomed, when they were done, and how they smelled.

#### Transplant some Perennials

Kids love the chance to dig in the dirt and make changes in the yard. Choose something like Lamb's Ear. It's a hearty variety that will likely take to its new location right away.

#### Pressing Flowers

If you've never done it before, all you need is some cardboard, a few sheets of paper, and some books. Lay a small piece of cardboard (just big enough to hold the flower you want to press) on a table and add a sheet of paper. Now, lay your flower on the paper. Cover the flower with another piece of paper and more cardboard. Lay a few books on top and leave it there for two weeks.

#### World's Biggest Flower


